Fortnightly Major Economic Indicators: 16-28 February 2025

Broad money slightly increased by 1.55 percent during July-February FY25 and stood at BDT 20,64,660.30 crore at the end of February 2025 compared to 1.73 percent increase during July-February FY24. This increase mainly stemmed from the increase in net domestic assets (NDA) during the period.

Domestic credit increased by 2.52 percent during July-February FY25 and stood at BDT 21,68,760.90 crore at the end of February 2025 compared to 4.01 percent increase during July-February FY24. The increase in domestic credit has been driven by the increase in both credit to the public sector and credit to the private sector. Credit to the public sector increased by 2.13 percent during July-February FY25 and stood at BDT 4,84,377.20 crore at the end of February 2025 compared to 1.24 percent decrease during July-February FY24. The positive credit growth in the public sector emerged from both net credit to govt. sector and credit to other public sector.

Credit to the private sector increased by 2.63 percent during July-February FY25 and stood at BDT 16,84,383.70 crore at the end of February 2025 compared to 5.53 percent increase during July-February FY24.

Bank deposits increased by 2.89 percent during July-February FY25 and stood at BDT 17,93,164.70 crore at the end of February 2025 compared to 4.20 percent increase during July-February FY24. The increase in bank deposits emerged from the increase in time deposits during the period.

Reserve money decreased by 9.44 percent during July-February FY25 and stood at BDT 3,74,602.90 crore at the end of February 2025 compared to the end of June 2024. Reserve money decreased due to decrease in both Net Foreign Assets (NFA) and Net Domestic Assets (NDA) of Bangladesh Bank under review.

Government borrowing from the banking system increased by BDT 26,225.98 crore during 01 July-27 February FY25 against the increase of BDT 12,298.91 crore during 01 July-27 February FY24^{©P}.

NBR tax revenue collection slightly increased by 1.76 percent and stood at BDT 2,21,817.09 crore during July-February FY25 compared to BDT 2,17,971.56 crore during July-February FY24. The target for NBR tax revenue collection was set at BDT 4,80,000.00 crore in the budget for FY25. NBR tax revenue collection during July-February FY25 was 46.21 percent of the target set for FY25.

Exports^{μ} increased by 10.41 percent to USD 32.94 billion during July-February FY25 compared to 6.33 percent decrease during the same period of the preceding fiscal year. Exports increased mainly due to increase in manufactured products exports during the period.

Custom-based imports increased by 5.33 percent to USD 46.46 billion during July-February FY25 compared to 15.49 percent decrease during the same period of the previous fiscal year. Besides, opening of import LC increased by 3.08 percent as well as settlement of import LC increased by 2.18 percent during July-January FY25. Import monitoring relaxation by BB might have contributed to the positive growth of import during the reported period.

Inward Remittances increased by 22.63 percent to USD 18.49 billion during July-February FY25 compared to 7.60 percent increase during the same period of the previous fiscal year. The consistent inflow of remittances can be linked to the interim government's initiatives aimed at persuading remitters to use formal banking channels instead of informal channels like hundi.

Current account balance recorded a deficit of USD 1.27 billion during July-February FY25 against the deficit of USD 4.07 billion during July-February FY24. The deficit in the current account balance emerged from the deficit in trade balance, services and primary income.

Foreign exchange reserves stood at USD 26.18 billion as on 27 February 2025 from USD 25.97 billion as on 29 February 2024.

Headline Inflation (point-to-point) eased down to 9.32 percent in February 2025 from 9.94 percent in January 2025. Meanwhile, **headline inflation (twelve-month average)** also slightly eased down to 10.30 percent in February 2025 from 10.34 percent in January 2025. Decrease in headline inflation (point-to-point & twelve-month) can be attributed to a reduction in food food inflation due to decrease of vegetable price. Additionally, the effects of contractionary policies are expected to further influence inflationary pressures in near future.
